LOCAL CANINES GIVE "TWO PAWS UP" TO NEW DOG PARK!

Miami Shores is getting a dog park. It will be in the triangular shaped green space on the Aquatic Center's grounds. A petition was started in March of 2016 by Elizabeth Cowen, but desires for a canine companion park had been vocalized as far back as 2005. It took the combination of activated citizenship and a willing council to get it on the docket. The matter went before council in May and was swiftly approved. Work began in mid-September with the removal of the Brito beach ball sculpture and the analysis of the site's drainage. The entire construction is expected to take about four months to complete.

This sounds like a wonderful addition to the Miami Shores park system. For a village of 10,000 residents, we have approximately 2,500 canine pets. It was only recently (2014) that we got 'mutt mitts' dispensers installed in highly frequent areas such as the library and the areas around the recreation center. So, getting a dog park passed and started within less than eight months is impressive. The residents should be applauding the swiftness of our village council. How often do things happen that quickly in government?

The adage that one size does not fit all is appropriate here. Not everyone is satisfied with the size and location of the park. The parcel is about one third of an acre. The American Kennel Club recommends at least one full acre but the average, from my research, is about half an acre. So, yes, ours will be on the small side. There will be separate areas for small dogs (>thirty pounds) and large dogs (<thirty pounds). A six-foot fence with a double gate system

will be installed. Park benches, doggie water fountains, covered picnic tables, recycle bins, garbage bins, and dog waste bins are all in the works as well.

The main complaint is about the location. Read the budget hearing and council minutes from September 20th. They are available on the village website. Biscayne Boulevard is a busy thoroughfare and parking for Shipwreck Cove can get chaotic on a packed, sunny, summer day. The location is not up for discussion. The site has been chosen and the residents will have to live with it. But the parking concern can be handled. In a memorandum from our Village Manager, Tom Benton, to our Village Council dated September 14th the issue of parking is addressed. Additional spaces can be constructed (north side of the aquatic center), but action will not be taken until the need presents itself. The noise from the boulevard is another issue entirely. One that is being hotly debated by residents on various social media platforms like Facebook and Nextdoor. Is there a need for a sound barrier wall to be built? Has that been considered in the budget? Would trees be a more efficient and visually pleasing buffer? The plans for the park call for six shade trees. Will that be enough?

The estimated budget for the dog park is \$181,314.00. That includes the relocation of the Brito sculpture, concrete pads, new sod, signage, and the card reader entry system. The total cost is expected to be lower as all items listed are in round figures and estimates only. The budget is available for all who ask to see it. Just stop by or call the Village Hall. One might ask,

why the need for a pass-key gate? If you frequent the pool or participate in community center classes, you probably already have one of the magnetic strip ID cards. They are free to all Shores residents. One needs only apply for one. Safety for you and your canine pals is the main reason for the card reader entry. But there might be other benefits, too, like tracking usage. If the park has a high volume of patrons, will an additional park be considered? One that is more pedestrian friendly?

GREATER MIAMI SHORES SCHOOLS REPORT

Sponsored by grants from the Miami **Shores Community Alliance and Unite** Miami Shores, Barry University and the **Community Learning Partnership (CLP)** offered a new event to create awareness about the realities of poverty and shift perceptions about individuals trapped in the system. The Poverty Simulation, offered at universities across the country, is designed to help participants understand what it is like to live in a typical lowincome family and the overwhelming demands of everyday life. Over 100 CLP students participated from The Cushman School, Doctors Charter School, Horace **Mann Middle School and Miami Country** Day School. Barry students served as volunteers to hosts booths related to community resources such as food stamps, transportation, employment, health care, child care and housing. Upon arriving,

of poverty and the issues they face on a daily basis.

The Poverty Simulation supports efforts from the Community Learning Partnership to create awareness about social justice issues related directly to youth. About 15 million children in the U.S.-21% of all children, live in families with incomes below the federal poverty threshold, which is approximately \$24,000 for a family of a 4.

Feedback from students and teachers who participated in the event was very positive. A social studies teacher from Miami Country Day School shared: "I've always thought of myself – at least in recent years – as someone who possesses empathy, and who lives my life with understanding of and respect for those not like me. This experience, however, showed me that while I have indeed attempted empathy, I wasn't even close to being equipped to place myself in the shoes of those who live each day just trying to

get by. This event was not only a paradigmshifting experience for me professionally (it will impact the way I teach government), but it also challenged my political views and my personal relationships. I need to spend some time reflecting, for sure, but I am eager to explore some of these issues further."

A Barry University student shared: "My character was a 17 year old male who got a 16 year old girl pregnant and my mom was a single mom trying to make it and I didn't have money so the quickest way I could do it was to drop out of school. I thought about applying for a job, but realized I needed quick money so I sold drugs, got arrested twice but again my whole mindset was to get quick money, so I can help my mom and also help my girlfriend that was pregnant. It was eye opening, I loved it and this shows you can't judge people if you don't know what they are going through at home and judging should be the last thing that anyone should do so—lesson learned!"
